Global Classroom in Teacher Education

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Module 1: International and Intercultural Education

International Education Systems, Policies and Practices

Winter and Summer Semester

BA and MA

3 Credit Points

This seminar is aimed at incoming international students as well as students of UoE Weingarten who plan to go abroad or have already done so. After introducing students to the current state of the German / Baden-Württemberg educational system and to current issues in education, international teams of students will give internationally comparative presentations on current issues in education. The seminar is combined with 2–3 excursions to regional educational institutions (such as museums, schools, nature reserve information centres...), it is necessary to subscribe to the respective separate course in LSF.

Excursions to regional educational institutions for incoming international students

Winter and Summer Semester

2 Credit Points

The seminar “International Education: Systems, Policies and Practices” is complemented by 2–3 one-day excursions for incoming international students. During the excursions participants are introduced to educational approaches implemented at different educational institutions (such as museums etc.), as well as to aspects of regional educational history. Dates of the excursions are to be determined together with participants to coordinate with their learning schedules. Participants are expected to hand in written assignments reflecting on the topics introduced during the excursions and relating them to the contexts of their home countries.



Intercultural Learning

Summer Semester

What is the meaning of intercultural competence within a globalized society? This is the focal question dealt with in the bilingual seminar. It is aimed to work on reflection- and action-competences concerning an intercultural-globalized context. The seminar offers a combination of theoretical and practical parts. Active participation is expected; i.e. working on the offered sources, preparing a presentation with others and being ready to reflect on the experiences and share this with others.

Intercultural and global education (Interkulturelle und globale Bildung)

In this seminar, we will address the importance of intercultural and global education. It will focus on the promotion of intercultural understanding, global perspective and the development of pedagogical and didactic thinking and practice relevant to a diverse and interconnected world. The seminar is held in English and offers a reflective examination of topics such as global responsibility, intercultural communication and the challenges of the international educational landscape. The seminar is particularly recommended for students who are interested in or already planning a semester abroad/internship abroad. Take the opportunity to broaden your perspectives and prepare yourself for the demands of a globalized world of education!

Beyond the Bake Sale – Family School Partnerships in the Context of Newly Immigrated Families

With the beginning of the war in Ukraine, teachers once again face a new influx of students who not only have limited or no German language skills but are also burdened by emotional and psychological stress. Similar challenges have arisen in recent years as a result of large-scale migration movements. Since late summer 2015, more than one million refugees have arrived in Germany, fleeing wars, terrorism, economic hardship, or the effects of climate change (Law & Eckes, 2010; Schlechter et al., 2019). These developments have significantly

changed the educational landscape, as school systems continue to struggle to provide quality programmes that meet the diverse needs of newly arrived learners (Law & Eckes, 2010; Schlechter et al., 2019; Schroeder, 2018). This seminar presents a model of school improvement developed to support a German secondary school in addressing these challenges. The model is based on five dimensions of school development: staff development, instructional development, organizational development, cooperation, and family engagement. Within this framework, the seminar focuses in particular on the development of family engagement as a key component for successful integration and language learning. Participants will explore theoretical and practical perspectives on school improvement, parental involvement, and support for students with German as a second language, and they will collaboratively design ideas for school-based implementation.

The seminar is conducted in a blended-learning format, combining in-person sessions with online collaboration. By the end of the seminar, participants will be able to: understand and explain the five-way model of school improvement in relation to linguistic and cultural diversity, describe and reflect on current educational challenges related to migration, displacement, and multilingual classrooms, analyse and evaluate national and international approaches to supporting students with German as a second language, identify and discuss strategies for family engagement as a key component of school development, apply theoretical insights to the design of a digital media project addressing family-school cooperation and inclusion, and collaborate effectively in partner and group work within a blended-learning environment.

Societal challenges as transversal education chance

The title of the lecture refers to 'epoch-typical key problems' as the centre of a 'new general education concept' (Klafki, 1985/1996, p. 43ff.). In terms of pedagogy and didactics, this concept addresses the central social challenges of its time. Education and society should be thought of as two sides of an interdependent coin. Through self-determined, co-determined and solidarity-orientated educational opportunities for all – across the lifespan – the future should be conceived and shaped in the present with constructive reference to the past. This can also strengthen the perspective of global citizenship education, which has been known since antiquity and is discussed today as global citizenship education.

The need for comprehensive social transformation – prominently described in the Sustainable Development Goals (UN, 2015) – is also associated with educational challenges. These are considered in educational and cultural policy at state level (guiding perspectives of the education plans) and federal level (Global Development Framework). In the field of

educational science, various concepts have been presented in recent decades that make social challenges the starting point for educational work (outside of school). In addition to clarifying fundamental contexts – epoch-typical cross-sectional challenges, the Great Transformation and Sustainable Development Goals – two conceptual suggestions are acknowledged as pedagogical research fields for orientation purposes – global learning for sustainable development and intercultural pedagogy – in order to suggest systematic questions of professionalization and general didactics on this basis.

The aim of SDG 4.7 is to promote inclusive, equitable and quality education and raise awareness of sustainable development worldwide. In this lecture series, different perspectives on the topic SGD 4.7 will be presented and discussed. Moreover an intercultural dialog and exchange on the various positions on SDGs and good practice examples will be facilitated. We look forward to your participation and to interesting discussions that will contribute to a broader view of education and its role in global transformation. Module 2: Intercultural Teaching Practice

Teach and Learn at the Talschule Weingarten

School Teaching Internship

The Internship at the Talschule Weingarten provides an opportunity for international students to gain experience in a primary school setting.

- The students are supported in planning and performing their 'Teach-Learn-Sequences'
- Students receive feedback and constructive input to improve teaching and also for their professional decision-making
- Students get an inside look at the German school environment
- They gain valuable knowledge as well as language training in either German or English.

At the beginning of the internship, the students choose a topic from the class education plan and work on this with the pupils. Subjects in the plan for the primary school are, for example:

- Bird migration
- Animal hibernation
- Introduction of the country represented by the students
- Presentation of traditions or festivals of the various countries
- Autumn / Winter decorations
- Themes from Maths or General Subjects.

Classes are for 90 minutes with a 30-minute feedback and discussion session afterwards. The class is generally taught by one person or in tandem with another student. Teachers from the school as well as from the university are available to assist the students when preparing and to offer materials for use.

Reflective learning encourages intercultural exchange. It also makes it possible to observe new perspectives and important learning experiences. The student's own 'Teach-Learn-Sequence' will be observed by their peers, teachers and university Lecturers and discussed afterwards. The criteria for this is the previously compiled observation catalog "What should we observe and reflect on?".

It is worth noting that the pupils from the primary school also highly profit from the internship. The friendly and outgoing internships bring fun, cultural traditions and many new impressions from other countries into their classroom

English for All: Training your English Language Skills

You would like to brush up and expand your English skills? Then come and join the course 'English for all'. A variety of different activities, exercises and worksheets will help you to improve your speaking, listening, reading and writing skills in English. The course will cover topics on current news and issues, everyday language, culture, society, people, geography, history, etc. Grammar topics will be adjusted according to the needs of the participants. Participants should bring along A2/B1 level English skills.

English Speaking Fluency

This speaking tutorial is open to all students and international students looking to improve their speaking and communication skills in a relaxed atmosphere. English Speaking Fluency is a tutorial



designed to help students improve their spoken English. This student-led tutorial aims to develop fluency, accuracy, and confidence through a variety of conversation focused activities. The interactive sessions will focus on speaking practice, fluency, vocabulary development, and grammar support. The sessions are based on your needs. Join us and take your English speaking skills to the next level!

Language Awareness

Summer Semester

BA and MA

3 Credit Points

This course aims to reflect on language use with a focus on grammar. We will practice different verb forms through communicative activities. Through a variety of communicative approaches, we will discover, learn, and practice different aspects of the English language with a strong focus on grammar. Theoretical material as well as practical tasks and activities will be included in this course. The class language is English and you are encouraged and expected to

participate actively in English. You can do it! Assessment is dependent on your study program. It may be a learning log, essay, or exam. Students will be informed in class.

Academic Writing

Winter and Summer Semester

3 Credit Points

This course will give you the opportunity to improve your academic writing skills and research skills through a variety of activities and exercises. These include developing critical reading skills in order to evaluate sources, writing a research essay, and providing feedback on each other's work. Students will need to achieve a minimum of 60% (written assignments, quizzes, exercises, etc.) to pass this course.

In this course, you will improve your writing skills by reading and analyzing texts as well as writing a variety of texts, including a research paper. Students will need to achieve a minimum of 60% (written assignments, quizzes, exercises, etc.) to pass this course.

Introduction to Second Language Acquisition

This course aims to deepen and broaden students' understanding of second language acquisition and learning by introducing influential theoretical models of first and second language acquisition. It offers a general introduction to scientific research into how people learn a second language, as well as key psychological factors underpinning language development.

TEFL: TBLL Digital Media

Task-based language learning (TBLL) and teaching (TBLT) refers to a strong version of Communicative Language Teaching. As described in the CEFR (Council of Europe 2001), as well as demanded in the German "Bildungsplan" the overall aim of English as a Foreign Language Learning and Teaching is that students acquire intercultural communicative competence in a task-based way.

In this seminar we want to take a closer look at tasks and what differentiates them from 'simple' exercises. We will explore in how far they are suitable to cater to necessary conditions in terms of foreign language learning – Input, Interaction, Output – and variables that influence language learning. Accordingly, we will be looking at linguistic, psycholinguistic, (neuro)psychological foundations, as well as methodological perspectives.

After having dealt with these theoretical foundations the participants of this seminar are supposed to analyse and reflect on tasks as well as finally create tasks that are suitable for heterogeneous learner groups in primary and secondary classrooms.

Fachdidaktisches Projektseminar: Media in the Primary EFL Classroom

The seminar deals with different kinds of media (digital and non-digital alike) and how to use them effectively in the primary EFL classroom. Participants will have the opportunity to analyse (especially digital) media according to given or individually researched criteria. This way suitable material can be chosen and learning opportunities can be designed using the media.

Introduction to Secondary TEFL

The seminar provides an introduction to the principles, methods and procedures of teaching English as a foreign language in secondary schools. It also deals with special didactic aspects such as reciprocal teaching, using work stations in lesson, etc. Apart from the theoretical background of teaching English to learners of secondary schools, the course will also provide practical examples to illustrate the theory.

The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are 17 goals defined by the United Nations to tackle the world's largest problems by 2030. Global citizenship education (GCE) was included as a global target in the 2015 SDGs as Indicator 4.7.1. The aim is to mainstream GCE into national education policies, curriculums, assessment, and teacher education programs by 2030.

Therefore GCE is a critical aspect of teaching culture in the foreign language classroom and will be explored in this course.

As this course aims at preparing you in intercultural teaching in both theory and practice, it is also conceived as part of a "virtual exchange". This means that our class will be linked to another class of a colleague from the English Department at the Universidade Federal de Santa Catarina in Brazil. You will be put into small project groups to work together on a series of collaborative tasks, developing your language, intercultural competence and digital skills. The virtual exchange will take place over a 8-week period between April and June, and you will meet with your project groups on a weekly basis.

PLEASE NOTE: If you wish to enroll for this class, in addition to our class time, you will be required to attend our in-person class as well as meet on a weekly basis with your project group throughout the 8 weeks of our exchange:

Advanced Foreign Language Teaching Linguistics: Gamification in the EFL Classroom (Blended Learning Class)

During the course, we will investigate ways how gamification can be incorporated into the foreign language classroom. The students will get to know various concepts of gamification, they will research materials, and evaluate games/gamified teaching material. They will develop one gamified teaching project and they will carry it out in cooperating classrooms while researching critical aspects. The teaching unit will be taught in schools between appr. 2.12. and 12.12. Later, they will present the project process and research results to the seminar.

Adv. Foreign Language Teaching Linguistics CLIL (PO 2015)/ Fachdidaktisches Projektseminar (PO 2025)

In the first part of the seminar, students learn about innovative teaching approaches that combine CLIL (Content and Language Integrated Learning) with game-based learning. In the second part, groups of students develop teaching materials for cooperating school classes. These materials address topics related to sustainability. In the third part, the groups teach in cooperation with the teachers and then reflect on their lessons and the materials. Please note, there will be one compact phase on Friday, 17th April, 13.30 – 18.00.



TEFL: Heterogeneous Classrooms: Including everybody!

In the past decades, academic diversity in schools has increased substantially. Apart from 'general' individual differences, there are larger numbers of second-language learners in our schools, many different cultures, as well as an increasing number of students with Special Educational Needs.

How does EFLT respond to the growing diversity in our classrooms and how can English teachers ensure that all students are included? In this seminar we will be looking at approaches and teaching strategies suitable to cater to all individuals in our heterogeneous EFL-classrooms.

TEFL: Assessing Language Competence

The seminar deals with the different language skills and how they can be taught and assessed in the EFL classroom. Apart from this, the participants will also be given the chance to self-assess their own language performance. Takes place online.

This course aims to improve the intercultural competences of the students through critical reading, thinking and self-reflection based on different literary texts. It will provide students with various tools and texts that can be used to improve intercultural communicative competence.

In this course, we will gain insight into the field of cultural studies, a study of culture, and make connections with the EFL classroom. To do this, we will read, watch, examine, think about, respond to, and discuss a variety of topics, texts, and media. We will learn about “cultural studies”, research topics related to cultural studies, read critically, discuss different topics, and produce individual and collaborative work. A variety of assignments will be completed inside and outside of the classroom. To pass this course, students must complete 60% of all assignments by the due dates.

Culture 1: UK in text and film

Winter and Summer Semester

BA

3 Credit Points

This course offers an overview of some major developments and transformations in British literature and culture. With its focus on history it will make students familiar with the key events in British History. We will also have a look at some films that are closely connected with the cultural topics.

Culture 2: Indigenous Studies

Winter and Summer Semester

BA and MA

3 Credit Points

This course will give an overview of the struggles, challenges, and victories of the Indigenous Peoples of Canada. History, geography, and terminology (Can “Indian” be used?) will be introduced. Students will be afforded the opportunity to discuss the issues facing the First Nations and come to a better understanding of the interaction between them and the rest of

the world. Students are not required to have previous knowledge of the topic to participate in the course.

Literature & Culture: Young Adult Film

Winter and Summer Semester

BA and MA

3/5 Credit Points

The seminar will discuss the nature and evolution of young adult films with particular emphasis on their current condition and their value to their intended audience. Another focus will be the cultural analysis of the films. This literature seminar is based on the theoretical maxim that films should be considered literary works. Therefore, the reception of whole films is mandatory. Watching and streaming/buying films It will be necessary to watch films primarily outside regular class time. I pre-selected films that are either free of charge or mostly rather cheap (and can be streamed or bought from different streaming services). An alternative might be that you coordinate with other students to buy films in turn.

Adv. Cultural Studies: USA – Manifest Destiny, Civil War, Civil Rights Movement

This course is designed to help you develop an informed perspective on US American history and its challenges. The class is conceived of as a complement to a more general cultural studies course. Therefore, instead of focusing on a wide range of topics and contexts, we will only engage in a few particularly significant case studies that is Manifest Destiny, American Civil War and Civil Rights Movement. We might also watch films within and after seminar sessions.

Literature Studies

Literature 1: Children's Books and Teenage Fiction

The seminar will discuss the nature and evolution of young adult literature with particular emphasis on its current condition and its value to its intended readership. At the beginning of the semester, the young adult novels to be read in the course will be announced.

Advanced Literary Studies: Multicultural Literature

This course is a survey of literature by writers and directors with distinct national, social, or ethnic identities. This survey involves reading, analyzing, and interpreting significant literary works within their historical, social, and cultural contexts. Diversity in literature goes beyond ethnicity. Diversity may include the various facets of sexuality and gender, cultural, and societal groups. The seminar will discuss the nature and evolution of multicultural literature with particular emphasis on its current condition and its value to its intended readership. As this literature seminar is also based on the theoretical maxim that films should be considered literary works, we will also include multicultural films in our discussions. Since the reception of whole films is mandatory too, you may have to buy films as well as books.

Lektüreseminar: Montaignes Essay

Winter and Summer Semester

3/5 Credit Points

With his "Essais", Montaigne (1533–1592) created a new philosophical form: the literary "essay". The central theme of his reflections and observations is the analysis of human beings as complex and contradictory creatures. Drawing on his extensive life experience, Montaigne reflects with deep empathy on everyday topics such as friendship, fear and loneliness. In this seminar, we will discuss selected passages from Montaigne's nearly 1,000-page work. To prepare for the critical examination of the text, students are expected to read a selection of passages each week. The seminar assignment can be completed in the form of either a text analysis or a lesson plan.

Theology / Religious Studies

Culture 2: Religious Themes in Popular Culture and Literature

Summer Semester

3 Credit Points

The seminar will explore religious themes in our world and lives. Students will gain a deeper understanding of how religious themes continue to shape our contemporary world and contribute to ongoing discussions about identity, culture, and society. Various media such as film, literature, and music will be included in this course.

Women and theology: viewpoints, voices and 'vitae' within the Christian tradition

Winter Semester

BA and MA

3 Credit Points

This course is open to all students who had English as a subject at school. We will be reviewing themes such as religion and theology, and the roles and ideas of female authors and of historical figures. We will consult both historical texts and contemporary media (print and visual). Texts from various sources will be considered and discussions and exercises will stimulate a conversation between the positions represented by these texts and notions commonly found within the Christian theological and spiritual tradition. The language of instruction is English and participants will be encouraged to take part in our class discussions in accordance with their language.

Religious Themes in Popular Culture and Literature

Summer Semester

The seminar will explore religious themes in our world and lives. Students will gain a deeper understanding of how religious themes continue to shape our contemporary world and contribute to ongoing discussions about identity, culture, and society. 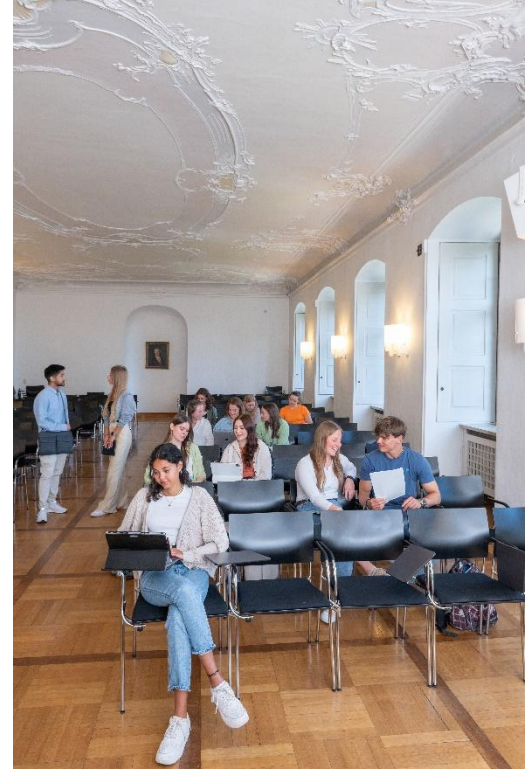
Lektüreseminar: Montaigne's Essay

With his "Essais", Montaigne (1533–1592) created a new philosophical form: the literary "essay". The central theme of his reflections and observations is the analysis of human beings as complex and contradictory creatures. Drawing on his extensive life experience, Montaigne reflects with deep empathy on everyday topics such as friendship, fear and loneliness. In this seminar, we will discuss selected passages from Montaigne's nearly 1,000-page work. To prepare for the critical examination of the text, students are expected to read a selection of passages each week. The seminar assignment can be completed in the form of either a text analysis or a lesson plan.



Philosophizing on Contemporary Feminist Topics (Philosophieren über gegenwertige feministische Themen)

For the seminar assignment, students are encouraged to engage with further topics of their choice, either working alone or in small groups, before presenting their work to the whole group.

Last but not least, the course reflects on the extent to which such heterogeneous groups are less of a loss than a gain compared to 'classical' groups and to what extent this is associated with fundamental music pedagogical insights for dealing with music.

Module 4: Introduction to German Language, Culture and School System

The German intensive course aims to prepare the students for their time in Weingarten and to help them get acquainted with the university. At the beginning of the course, the exchange students have the opportunity to get to know each other, exchange experiences and connect. The courses are then separated into the levels A1 / A2 and B1 / B2 and gives them language training

German course A1/A2 – B1/B2 Semester course (Deutsch Anfängerkurs für internationale Studierende A1/A2 OR Deutsch Fortgeschrittenenkurs für Internationale Studierende B1/B2)

The German course throughout the semester is divided into students with little to no knowledge of German (A1 / A2) and more advanced students (minimum language level B1) and are geared to international students from our partner universities. The courses impart university specific language competences to the students and accompany the students during their time in Weingarten. Within the framework of the course, all skills (listening and reading comprehension, speaking, writing) are practiced and regional studies about Germany and Europe are discussed. We attach importance to selecting the contents of the course by according to the students' interests. The course concentrates on listening and reading comprehension, speaking as well as written communication. The courses main focus is building on and training the communication skills through competency and learning by doing. The students learn the skills as 'independent users' according to the CEF (Common European Framework of Reference for Languages) and complete exam preparation for the levels A1 – B2.2.

Articulatory Phonetics for foreign Students studying German as a Foreign language

The exercises range from the basics of listening to the difference in words, pronunciation and gaining self-confidence to express oneself spontaneously in the German language. Themes: Standard Language Analysis / Pronunciation German, Articulatory Phonetics: starting from syllables, Practicing words and sentences up to free speaking
